

Dear Parents and Carers, I cannot quite believe we have reached the end of this academic year! When we look back on this very challenging, difficult and emotional time it is easy to focus on the sadness, the regret and the missed opportunities. However, as I write to you today and I look at the photos in this newsletter I am filled with pride, joy and an overwhelming sense of content. That as a community we have made the absolute best of this situation. We haven't got it perfect, but my goodness we have tried. You have all tried so hard at home, we too have tried here. We have much to be proud of as a school community, each unique and wonderful pupil and family. We collected over 150 rainbows over the Easter weekend to make a collage and slides for the maternity ward at Muserove, which was then celebrated at County level. We created a virtual choir and an original song to say thank you to Key Workers (special thanks to Mr M for his help with that). We made a new school from across the Moorland Federation to make sure the Key Workers could continue with their critical front line work. We opened to year R and 1 in their own classes with their own teachers. We extended this to offer every child a chance to reconnect with our school, their teacher and classroom, before the holidays. We ran a food bank, a delivery service, including a medication delivery service, organized a phone call system for those feeling lonely and isolated, we even supported safeguarding locally with safe and well checks in the community. We found new partnerships to make this happen, the rangers, Kilve staff, Minehead Eye and the Food Bank. Finally, we gave our year 4 pupils the send off they so deserved, we brought Pinkery to them. Pinkery came to school! We had three days of pupils here on our Dunster site, two Dunster groups and one Timberscombe group, from early in the morning until late at night. They took part in axe throwing, archery, team building games, wildlife walks, bat watch, forestry skills, toasted marshmallows round a campfire and learnt how to put up and take down tents. The highlight for most of them, was of course, the grass sledging, and after three days of pushing kids down hill on sledges my senior team and I are very ready for a rest! This additional work at the end of this year was both a privilege and pleasure., I have laughed so much with our wonderful children and staff in this last week as we shared pure moments of joy. I could not be prouder of everyone and our school. We hope September brings a little more normality, but regardless of the challenges ahead, what I have learnt from this time is that my team and I will always find a way to make the best of a situation for our children. This really is a very precious group of staff and pupils. The effort to transform our site for our Early Years provision has been humbling, the staff truly love our school. Please relax, enjoy the break and we will be back in touch nearer to September. Until then stay safe, well and happy. Mrs Naomi Philp

Timberscombe Good Neighbours


