### **Crime Updates**

In the surrounding beat areas in Minehead we had some thefts from work vans, where tools were taken. 2 persons were stopped and many tools recovered.

Please be vigilant by not keeping tools in vans overnight if it can be helped.

This applies to garden sheds too keep items out of sight and appropriate locks.

In Porlock the Bowling community hall was broken into and some money taken from within. Causing damage to doors. We had a similar incident in Minehead on the same evening.

Please consider now the darker evenings are upon us motion lighting is extremely helpful for more remote locations which come on when motion triggers it this is often a deterrent for potential thieves. Where possible consider alarms and CCTV.

Two women have been arrested in connection with tool thefts in West Somerset.

We received a call from a man in Minehead at about 3.20am on Thursday 24 October that he had disturbed two people he believed were trying to break into a vehicle.

The two individuals fled the scene in a white car, but the witness was able to provide us with a description of the vehicle and a partial registration number.

Subsequent enquiries were carried out and we stopped a vehicle matching the description given on the A358 approaching Williton approximately 30 minutes after the initial call. When officers opened the boot of the car, they found a large number of power tools.

We believe the power told belong to a number of victims across the West Somerset area in crimes committed overnight between Minehead and Bishops Lydeard on 23-24 October. We have recorded the serial numbers of the tools recovered and are attempting to reunite them with their rightful owners.

Two women inside the car, who are both in their 20s, were arrested. They have been released on bail while our enquiries continue.

Please take a few moments to read the important information below:

#### **FRAUD ALERT**

People in Avon and Somerset have reported receiving fraudulent text messages, telling them to pay a fictitious parking fine.

This is an example of 'phishing' when cyber criminals use fake messages to lure people to click on links within a scam email or text message or give away sensitive information.

In this case, recipients are encouraged to click on a link to pay, which takes them to a website that looks convincingly like an official government page. They are then asked for their email address, vehicle registration and card details to make a payment, usually £20.

If you receive a text message like this, DON'T click on the link, as fraudsters can steal your personal and financial data to commit identity fraud and take your money. Even clicking the link and not entering any information could result in malware and computer viruses being downloaded onto your device.

Report by forwarding the phishing text to 7726. This enables your provider to investigate the origin of the text and act, if found to be malicious.

If you have been coerced into giving away money or information to dishonest people, report this to your bank immediately (call 159 to be automatically connected to their fraud service) and to police via Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040.

By reporting you could protect many more people from being affected.

**Whats App Scam** 

#### What does it look like?

Fraudsters will pretend to be a relative, friend or someone you care about. They may contact you via WhatsApp stating they have a new number due to an emergency and will ask you to send money. They will often claim that their phone has been lost or damaged, or that they are unable to access their bank account. The criminals behind these scams are preying on people's kindness and desire to help others who are in need. WhatsApp is more commonly used for this particular scam but fraudsters may use other methods of communication such as email, SMS, or via social media.

#### What should you do?

- Call your relative/friend on the number you have saved for them.
- Avoid sending any money until you are satisfied that they are not a scammer.

#### Where to report?

- If you have been a victim of this scam, you can report to Action Fraud either online (www.actionfraud.police.uk) or over the phone (0300 123 2040).
- If you have sent money as part of this scam, contact your bank to report the fraud.
