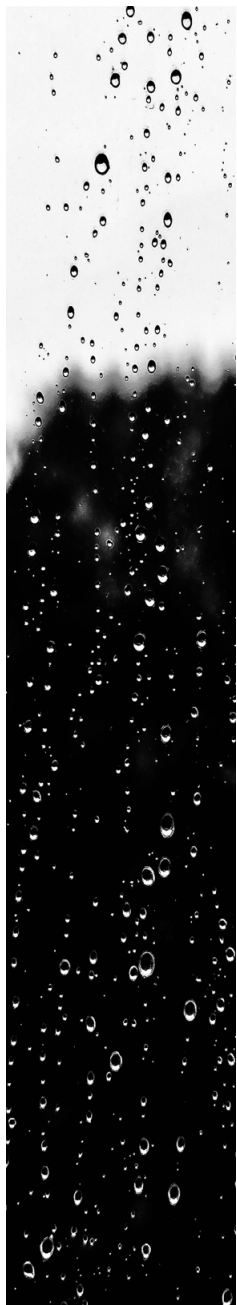

View from Grabbist October 25



Today, as I type, it's raining!

We so need rain after this parched summer, yet a residue of subliminal sadness lingers in me when it comes to rain, perhaps vestiges of gloom from wet waits for late buses on drier and drumly afternoons in 1970s Ayrshire. The blame for the bad memories lies more with the buses than the weather, but the association sticks!

That aside, I've come to love the rain and the sound of it. And, ah, the smell! Petrichor is the word for this, caused by geosmin from algae and bacteria, ozone from lightening and oils released by plants all in the rainwater. We humans are particularly sensitive to it, possibly an evolutionary development to help us find water. All we need is the equivalent of 1 teaspoonful of these components in 200 Olympic sized swimming pools worth of water for us to be able to smell it.*

The late Thich Nhat Hanh, Zen master and peace activist, said '*In Plum Village ... there used to be a veranda called the Listening to the Rain Veranda. We made it ... so we could sit there and listen to the rain and not need to think about anything. Listening to the rain can help the mind come to stillness.*' (The Art of Living p.8).

Our times are very noisy, and every day loud, demanding voices clamour for our attention. It is all the more important that we find ways to come to stillness, and - given that we are now well into autumn - we could do worse than having our own *Listening to the Rain Veranda*, if not a veranda, a simple space to be and listen to the rain! Just 5 minutes could make such a huge difference.

'*Be still and know that I am God*' sang the ancient poet (Psalm 46). You may well have heard this line, but it is set in a perplexing poem of crashing waves, uproarious nations and much conflict. Here, 'The Lord' breaks in to overthrow not people, but war itself.

If we are to be part of the healing of this fractured world, roiling again with much noise and hatred, we need to learn how to find stillness. We cannot make peace unless we become peace. And the deep divine peace which is present in every single one of us can be rediscovered quite simply by listening to rain.

We also can contemplate how rain comes when the ground is parched and when we fear the recklessness of folk playing with fire while the grass is like straw. Today, we so need the rain of kindness, of peace, of relationship and listening and understanding while people play with the fires of hate and division.

The rain will come. In fact, it is here if you and I still our restless hearts and minds. And as we find it, we can become the bringers of rain on parched ground in our world.

It begins by being still.....
